New Developments at Broomstick Estate

We often are asked by our customers "...do you sell white wines as well as your great Shiraz?" Well, we can now report after taking a deep breath and much soul searching, we are about to plant new blocks of Chardonnay and Sauvignon Blanc grapes.

We have commenced soil preparation, installing sub-surface drainage and irrigation. The planting will occur after winter.

The bulk of the grapes will go to Howard Park Wines but we will ensure a Broomstick Estate Chardonnay will also be available.

The 2004 Harvest

The 2004 harvest occurred a little early this year. We believe it will be known as one of the best vintages in Margaret River. A warm, dry Summer running into Autumn allowed the fruit to ripen slowly. Quality was exceptionally good with yields slightly down for the red varieties.

We picked our Cabernet Sauvignon for the first time this year. The wines are now maturing in oak for release in a year's time.
